  - Register for EOC testing for Scholars diploma

  - FAFSA forms available for financial aid do not mail until after Jan
     1.

  - December SAT and ACT Tests.
  - January SAT Test.
  - Mid-year Grade Report to colleges

# SENIOR YEAR – WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING?

#### March - May

- College Choice
  - May 1 Common Response Date Acceptance of admission; withdraw other applications
  - Wait List Decision
  - Visit colleges offering admission Final Choice
- Records, Testing and Academic
  - March SAT Test
  - Finalize plans for housing, financial aid and Scholarships.
  - May AP Tests, SAT/ACT Tests re-take, if necessary, for Bright Futures
  - Bright Futures Notifications
  - EOC testing for Scholars Diploma qualification

## HOW TO REQUEST A TRANSCRIPT

- Order a Transcript for \$2 to check on the following:
  - correct spelling of name
  - social security number
  - all credits are entered
  - courses have been grade forgiven
  - The right level of courses have been reflected (TV Pro 3 versus TV Pro 4)
  - Correct number of service hours
  - SAT/ACT scores have been entered correctly
  - any other information that may be missing
- Transcript requests are available in the guidance office with Mrs. Spurgeon & Ortiz
- Students can stop by and fill out a transcript request form between 8:30am and 3:45pm.
- Transcripts can be sent two ways: Electronically (ONLY to Florida Public Schools) and Paper (to all Private Florida schools and Out of State Schools).
- Paper transcripts are \$2.00 and take 3-5 days to process.
- Please order them well in advance of your deadline! We encourage all seniors to order at least one unofficial paper transcript to review for accuracy.
- Please check to see if transcript was submitted

Transcripts can be ordered at <a href="www.sjrstate.edu">www.sjrstate.edu</a> under the student tab you will see transcripts/records. Send these transcripts to your final college you will be attending

### SCHOLAR'S RECOGNITION

- Scholar Designation The requirements of the scholar designation include all requirements of a standard diploma plus:
- Pass Algebra 1 EOC
- Earn one credit in Algebra 2
- Earn one credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course (Pre-Calculus, AP Calculus AB/BC)
- Pass the Biology 1 EOC
- Earn one credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the US History EOC
- Earn two credits in the same foreign language
- Earn at least one credit in AP, Dual Enrollment
- Take an online course
- Alert counselor if these requirements have been met

### MERIT DESIGNATION

- ■The requirements of the *merit designation* include all requirements of the standard diploma plus:
- Attain one or more approved industry certifications (generally in the Academy program the student has participated in at CHS)
- Please alert counselor if these requirements have been met

### RISK FOR GRADUATION

- We have options available to aid your student
- Conference with teachers and counselor
- Set up in recovery lab (PLATO) (Science courses not available)
- Courses can also be recovered online through FLVS
- FCTC Adult Basic Education Night courses to complete HS credit courses needed for graduation (see counselor for details)
- Monitor child's progress through Home Access Center

### **GPA**



- Unweighted GPA Graduation GPA
  - All courses (academic and elective) are averaged into the GPA; grade forgiveness applies
- Weighted GPA Ranking GPA
  - All courses (academic and elective) are averaged into the GPA; grade forgiveness applies
  - .5 weight for honors, 1.0 weight for AP and DE
- Bright Futures GPA and College Admissions GPA
  - All CORE academic courses plus 2 years of Foreign Language (plus optional 2 academic electives( are averaged into the GPA
  - .5 weight for honors, AP and DE for Bright Futures
  - .5 weight for honors, 1.0 weight for AP and DE for College Admissions
  - To Check eligibility for these 2 GPA's check www.FLVC.org Example: Unweighted: 4.0, Weighted: 4.688, Bright Futures: 4.3, College Admissions: 4.2

### **APPLICATION DEADLINES - VERY IMPORTANT!!**

- Rolling admissions
  - Can submit application at convenience but typically no later than Jan.1
  - Student notified within 4 weeks of application submission
- Regular Decision
  - Application submitted by college deadline date
  - Applications are evaluated and typically notified during spring semester
  - Most common
- Early Action
  - Process is highly selective not binding
  - Students are notified of decision and are allowed to apply to other schools
  - No financial awards are made until April
- Early Decision
  - Application submitted by Nov. 1 of your senior year
  - Decision is made by mid-December
  - Required to sign acceptance of admissions binding

#### What is Bright Futures

- Merit based scholarship program funded by the Florida Lottery.
- Its purpose is to reward academic achievement by providing funding to attend postsecondary education in Florida.
- There are three different awards within this program
- You are responsible to ensure you qualify for BF

# GENERAL ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR BRIGHT FUTURES

- Be a Florida resident and U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen as determined by you postsecondary institution.
- Enroll in an eligible Florida public or private postsecondary institution
- Enroll in a minimum of 6 hours per term (or the equivalent)
- Begin using the scholarship funds within two years of graduation (unless you enlist in the military).
- Must not be found guilty of, or plead no contest to, a felony charge.
- Must apply during your last year in high school –
   Application opens Dec. 1 of senior year.
- Please submit service hours as soon as possible to meet eligibility

- 3.5 Weighted GPA
- 16 credits of college prep courses
- 100 hours of community service
- 1290minimum SAT score (reading & math)
- 29 minimum composite
   ACT Score

- Current Recipients are earning \$103 per credit hour
- Subject to change

# MEDALLION SCHOLARS (FMS) - FOR STUDENTS GRADUATING IN JUNE 2014

### Initial Requirement

- 3.0 Weighted GPA
- 16 credits of college prep courses
- 75 hours of community service
- 1170 minimum SAT score (reading & math)
- 26 minimum composite
   ACT Score

### **Award Value**

- Current recipients are earning \$77 per credit hour
- Subject to change

# GOLD SEAL VOCATIONAL (GSV)- FOR STUDENTS GRADUATING IN JUNE 2014

3.0 Weighted GPA in "CORE" classes (instead of World Language that is counted for the other CORE GPA, use Fine Arts and HOPE)

3.5 Unweighted GPA in 3 vocational credits in 1 vocational program

SAT Score: 440 in Reading and Math

ACT: English 17, Reading 18, Math 18

Pert: Reading 104, Writing 99, Math 113

30 hours of community service

Beginning with 2012-13, students may be funded for up to 100% of their program of study in Career Education and Technical Degree Education programs; these include: Associate of Science degrees (AS), Associate of Applied Science degrees (AAS), College Credit Certificates (CCC), Postsecondary Adult Vocational (PSAV) career certificates, and Applied Technology Diplomas (ATD).

- Q = Where do students go to apply?
  - A = By completing the FLORIDA FINANCIAL AID APPLICATION available on line at:

www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org

- Q = When will students know if they qualify?
  - A = Eligibility evaluation are completed twice a year:
    - After 7<sup>th</sup> semester (fall)
      - Coursework completed, coursework in progress for spring and test scores for all tests taken through
         January 31<sup>st</sup>.
      - March notification
    - After 8<sup>th</sup> semester (spring)
      - Coursework completed and test scores for all tests taken through June 30<sup>th</sup>.
      - August notification
- Q = How can I determine my Bright Futures eligibility?
  - A = <u>FLVC.org</u> evaluation are based on the most recent transcript received from the students school district.
- Q = How will I be notified of my eligibility?
  - A = Notification will be sent by e-mail only.

Activate your User ID and PIN:

Know it, Use it and Be Responsible for your state financial aid!

- Q = What if I have a prepaid college plan?
  - A = You can use both the prepaid and the Bright Futures Scholarship. Bright Futures can be used to cover expenses that the prepaid plan does not cover.

#### Florida Student Identifier Number

Upon entry to the Florida School System, each student is assigned an official 10-digit Florida Student Identifier Number, which is the primary identifier for all education records and transactions. The number may be one of two formats (see below); the large majority of Florida Student Identifier Numbers are based on the Social Security Number format.

#### Format 1

If the student has a Social Security Number and it was provided to the school district, the Florida Student Identifier Number will have the following format:

First 9 digits: the student's Social Security Number; and The 10th digit: the letter "X".

If the student does not provide a Social Security Number to the school district, the school district will assign a 10-digit Florida Student Number Identifier to the student, formatted as follows:

**First 2 digits**: The first 2 digits will represent the district number of initial entry into the Florida school system; and **The Last 8 digits**: The last digits are district-defined in such a way as to result in a unique student number within the district in which the number is originally assigned.

The Florida Student Identifier Number is protected by student privacy laws and under no circumstances is the ID (or other personally identifiable information) released unless required by law. The ID number is encrypted when transmitted and stored as a confidential attribute. The ID number is also "dotted out" on the screen so that on-lookers are prohibited from viewing the information.




